This week we conclude our showcase of **nominated projects** for the 2019 Reshaping Rochester Awards! Take a moment to familiarize yourself with these projects and the impact they have had on their respective communities.

Our final set of featured nominations are...

Award for Urban Innovation in honor of Robert Macon



ROC the Riverway (Large Category Nomination)

ROC the Riverway is a long range planning document created by the City of Rochester focusing on the Genesee River Corridor in downtown, an integral piece of real estate in the area and important element for Rochester's rejuvenation. The essence of this plan is the consolidation of many separate projects from over the years into one, resulting in a connected pedestrian way along the river's edge--

one that goes throughout downtown and connects the north and south corridors of the city. Work is underway with the help of jump-start funding from the State for a guiding River Commission, Corn Hill river park, Charles Carroll Park, and river walk segments.

Sterling on Main (Small Category Nomination)

Sterling on Main blossomed from the removal of a one story under-utilized building and subsequent construction of a four story mixed use building on Main Street in the Village of Fairport. This project has contributed character and activity to the village. The first floor consists of leased commercial space, floors three-four contain apartments, and the building offers a rooftop terrace. Tenants of the building are provided generous size retail and

apartment spaces with the benefits of village living. All apartment units are rented at market rate.

Award for Activism in honor of Betty Strasenburgh



CJS Architects (Nomination)

CJS Architects is a practicing architectural design firm based in Western New York with a long history of aiming to make Rochester, and the east cost in general, a better place through its contributions. The firm began in the 1960s, when Bob Macon and Ann Chaintreuil formed a partnership. Their work included the Eastman School of Music Library and Selden Street townhouses, among

others. CJS shifted into their current leadership in the 1970s with the passing of Bob Macon. The firm is deeply involved in the local built environment and community organizations, such as the Landmark Society of Western New York, the Rochester Preservation Board, and the CDCR. Recent projects of note are mixed-use building South & Hickory Place, Park Point, and the in-progress Strong Museum Street of Play.

8 Lessons We've Learned About How to Build an Inclusive Community Project

A new river-based project presented by former Reshaping Rochester lecture speaker Richard Newton (OLIN) has brought with it some important community design lessons. "Bridge Park staff partnered with the D.C. staff of Local Initiatives Support Corporation (LISC) to convene a series of community meetings to create actionable recommendations in three categories: workforce development, supporting small business enterprises, and housing. Our Equitable Development Plan was announced in late 2015 and included 19 specific recommendations. The goal of this plan was to ensure that the 11th Street Bridge Park is a driver of inclusive development-development that provides opportunities for all residents regardless of income and demography."

Friday, Nov. 29 | 10:00AM-12:00PM | 3975 Lake Road, Williamson, NY 14589


